I am generally interested in the application of social psychology to health-relevant behaviors, by examining why people engage in behaviors that contradict their attitudes and intentions, even when doing so can have powerful negative health consequences. For example, in the past I have studied how alcohol affects attitudes and intentions to drink and drive or have sex without a condom. More

recent research interests include the influence of romantic relationship properties on safer sex behaviors, and applying social psychological theories to encourage hand hygiene behaviors among health care workers. Other research interest include conflict within romantic relationships, and the study of attitudinal ambivalence.
